

6. The Board also found concerns with Dr. Jerius' questionable clinical and medical judgement, which are compounded by Dr. Jerius not working in a clinical setting for almost a year and looking to work in a rural setting without potential referrals, oversight, or collaboration with a medical team that may not occur in such settings.

From these findings, the Board concludes the applicant, Dr. Jerius, failed to show the Board that he has a history free from any finding of the commission of any act that would constitute grounds for disciplinary action in North Dakota under 43-17-31, N.D.C.C. Thus, the Board further concludes that he does not meet the license requirements of 43-17-18, N.D.C.C.

A Notice of Informal Decision to Deny the License was issued which advised Dr. Jerius of the right to secure a formal hearing on the merits of the license application by requesting such hearing within sixty days of the Notice of the Informal Decision.

Pursuant to Sec. 50-02-12-01, NDAC, the Notice of Informal Decision to Grant a Restricted License was sent to Dr. Jerius by certified mail on February 7, 2022. Dr. Jerius acknowledged received of the decision on March 1, 2022.

More than sixty days have elapsed since the Notice of Informal Decision to Deny the License was received by Dr. Jerius, and no request for a formal hearing on the merits of the license application has been received by the Board.

Therefore, the Informal Decision to Deny the License now becomes the Formal Decision to Deny the License and it is the final order of the Board that the application of Dr. Jerius is hereby DENIED.
